

# **RANCH, RANGE, AND TOWN PLANT PRODUCTS**

**Division A**  
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Exhibitor must first pay the registration fee and obtain an exhibitors' number in the Home Arts Building. SEE SCHEDULE OF EVENTS & GENERAL RULES! Entries must be entered by the exhibitor and must be grown in Nevada. Persons entering exhibits for others must give name, address and exhibitor number of the grower.

## **General Rules:**

1. Number of entries not limited, but no exhibitor shall enter more than one exhibit in each class. In the event of lack of competition, prizes will be awarded or withheld on a merit basis.
2. Exhibitors removing exhibits without permission of the Superintendent will forfeit all prizes. Entries must remain until 4:00 p.m. Monday.
3. All entries are open to Adults and juniors. Adults and juniors will be judged separately. Juniors in this department are all those 17 years old and younger.

## **Judging:**

Doors will be closed at 6:00 pm, Thursday for judging. Exhibits will be open to the public Friday at 1:00pm.

## **FORAGE IN SHEAF**

Forage and grains in sheaves will be judged by the following standards: Exhibits should be well cured (dried) and should be tied securely but not tightly at the butt, the middle and below the heads. Use a uniform string or ribbon – no bailing twine please. Forage plants should be selected for quality as feed, not simply large size. Retain all leaves on specimens. Avoid coarse stems. Specimens should be clean (only the variety called for present in the sheaf).

Alfalfa and clovers should have five stems and the blossoms should not have yet gone to seed. Grasses and grains cut for hay should be gathered before the heads are mature (before they start to turn tan or yellow).

Wheat, rye and oats cut for grain should have fully mature heads.

## VEGETABLES

All vegetables entries should have the proper number of specimens. Select uniform, insect free, disease free and clean specimens. Beets, carrots, parsnips, radishes, rutabagas and turnips should be gently washed and tops cut to two inches. Stock beets, stock, carrots, stock rutabagas and stock turnips should be very large specimens. Potatoes should be dug at least two days before the Fair, then gently washed or brushed, being careful not to damage the skins. Air dry very thoroughly. Beans, cucumbers, squash and tomatoes should all have STEMS ATTACHED. Crookneck, Straight neck, Small Italian, Small Golden Zucchini, Patty Pan and any other "summer" type squash should be young and tender enough to not require peeling or removal of seed cavity for use in recipes. Banana, Hubbard, Buttercup, Large Italian, Large Golden Zucchini and any other "winter" type squash will be judged on size and uniformity. Dry onions should have properly cured (dried) tops. In order to cure, the tops must be twisted and been over several days before the Fair. Timing will vary with weather and irrigation patterns. Green Onions and Leeks should have the entire plant exhibited.

Exhibits will be judged on the basis of quality, number of kinds of plants, educational value, and attractiveness of display and ingenuity of the exhibitor. A wall or table space not to exceed nine square feet may be used by each exhibitor.

- A-175 Crop Forages: This entry is to consist of crops raised for livestock forage.
- A-176 Small Garden Display: This entry is for exhibitors that have fewer than seven entries in the individual vegetable categories.
- A-177 Cultivated Herbs: This entry is to consist of herbs grown for cooking or medicinal uses.
- A-178 Wild Plants Used For Food or Medicine: This entry is to consist of wild plants collected for food or medicinal purposes.
- A-179 Weeds: This entry is to consist of noxious or pest plants found in the yard, field or range.
